Collection note: This collection was donated in anticipation of the exhibition, "Beartoonist of San Francisco: Sketching an Emerging Subculture," at the GLBT History Museum from January-May 2017, curated by Jeremy Prince. Materials dated 2016 and 2017 were incorporated into the collection as donations from the donor in conjuncture with the exhibition.

Administrative/Biographical History

Fran Frisch's (August 18, 1948 - August 29, 2021) art career began in his hometown of St. Paul, Minnesota, where he started drawing cartoons for the *Twin Cities Gaze* and donated his time and artwork for worthy causes. By the late 1980s, he began drawing cartoons for the newly published *BEAR* magazine—Issue 8 contains his first cartoon—and in the same period, his first T-shirt featuring a bear, "Can U Bear it?", was, as he said, "the snowball that started it all for me and my art."

While visiting San Francisco in the late-1980s, Frisch also showed his portfolio to the *Bay Area Reporter*, and became their cartoonist for three years. He moved to San Francisco in 1990 and called the city his home for the next 17 years. Frisch helped produce Bear Expo '92-'94, created the graphics for International Bear Rendezvous from 1995-2007, and has created logos for numerous Bear clubs, including Bears Las Vegas (circa 1990), Bears of San Francisco (1994), and Bears San Diego (1998). His logos and designs have been printed on over 25,000 T-shirts.

Fran Frisch's first public showing of his cartoons was at Rumors in St. Paul, Minnesota. Like many starving artists, he could not afford frames for all his works so he laminated his prints and hung them on clotheslines with wooden clothes pins. Since he did not have enough prints to fill the whole bar, he supplemented his works with assorted laundry in between. In San Francisco, his first Bear art show was at My Place in South of Market about 1988. For many years after, the clothesline and campy clothes from thrift shops became his signature way to show his art. His last show presented on clotheslines was in Hawaii in 2005, when his art was suspended between two palm trees.

On top of his career as a cartoonist for newspapers, magazines, and art shows he installed at different bars in the Castro and South of Market districts, Frisch generously gave—and continues to give—back to the Bear and broader LGBT community. He routinely donated his time and artistic talent to providing raffle prizes and fundraising works for local bear organizations and events, and his art has helped raised money for multiple HIV/AIDS organizations, National Center for Lesbian Rights, PFLAG, the GLBT Historical Society, and countless more. And as a prostate cancer survivor, Frisch has donated to multiple fundraisers for prostate cancer awareness and testing. His drawings have raised over \$60,000 for a variety of charities around the world.

Frisch retired to Palm Springs, CA in 2007, where he resided until he passed away from bladder and rectum cancer on August 29, 2021.

Frisch's bears are both cuddly and sexual, playful and laidback yet radical and subversive; his cartoons epitomize what it means to be a Bear. Frisch was a pioneering artist who helped define the Bear community through his designs, and his drawings added a humorous context and sarcastic wit to the early definition of Bear masculinity.

Collection Scope and Content Summary

The Fran Frisch Collection of Prints and Original Drawings includes original cartoons and drawing created by Fran Frisch for various newspapers in Minneapolis and San Francisco, bear organizations, bars, and promotional materials for various art shows, as well as prints of his drawings and newspaper clippings containing his published works. This collection contains works that span Frisch's career, from Minneapolis in the mid- to late-1980s to the height of his career in San Francisco, followed by works created after he retired to Palm Springs in 2007.

The materials are mainly arranged chronologically, and the original order that Frisch sorted and sent the collection was maintained.

Collection Contents

Content Note: Most works, whether original drawings or prints, contain annotations on the sleeves from the artist, along with the year each work was created.
